



## AVALANCHE HAZARD RECOGNITION LECTURE SERIES DESCRIPTION

### **DETAILS:**

Cost of the Workshop: \$30 Per Person, \$25 for kids 16 years or younger

Workshop Duration: 1 Full Day

Tuition Includes: Instruction

Tuition Does Not Include: Round trip transportation to and from the class-site, food and water for the duration of the lecture.

### **LECTURE TOPICS TO BE INCLUDED:**

This lecture series is intended for backcountry travelers and enthusiasts ranging from skiers, snowboarders, climbers and more. This lecture series is meant to give a solid introduction to avalanche behavior, terrain, and snow instability. Topics to be covered include: Avalanche characteristics, terrain analysis, formation of avalanches, recognition of hazards, decision-making, safe travel, and self-help backcountry rescue.

#### Program curriculum consists of:

- Avalanche Characteristics
- Terrain Analysis
- Formation of Avalanches
- Recognition of Hazards
- Decision Making
- Safe Travel
- Self-Help Backcountry Rescue

### **PRE-REQUISITES:**

There are no pre-requisites for students interested in participating in this program.

### **WORKSHOP SCHEDULE:**

Pre-registration check-in will take place from 9:00-9:25 am. The program will run from 9:30 am to 5 pm with roughly an hour off for lunch around 12:30-1:30 pm. You are responsible for your lunch and if you like, there are places to eat nearby. *Plan to be back in the classroom on time as we start promptly!!*

**WORKSHOP LOCATION:** The workshop will be held at the Alaska Pacific University, Lecture Hall facility, room 102 in the Carr Gottstein Academic Center. Driving directions are included below.

**DRIVING DIRECTIONS:** From North, West or South: Take 36th Avenue East, past Lake Otis Parkway (36th becomes Providence Drive, then University Drive). Remain on Providence Drive past Providence Hospital - cross Elmore Street (3 way stop) and you are on University Drive and the APU campus.

From Northeast (Eagle River) or Southeast: Take Tudor Road to Elmore Street. Head North on Elmore Street approx 3/4 mile 'til the road ends at a 3 way stop; turn right and you are on the APU campus.

**PARKING:** Included on the second page of this handout is a map of the APU Campus. Please reference this for parking options.

### **PARTICIPANT GEAR REQUIREMENTS:**

Please be prepared for a full day of learning. Notebooks and pencils or pens are highly recommended. Since you will be

sitting the majority of the day drinks are allowed in the classroom.
